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**SEATTLE-TACOMA AREA FOSTER CARE ALUMNI HOLD FIRST EVER  
“FAMILY REUNION”**

*Attendees Highlight Needs of Washington’s Children in Foster Care and Look to  
Congress to Improve Nation’s Foster Care System*

**TACOMA, WA** —Young people and adults gathered today in Tacoma to attend the first annual “Together 2008: Alumni Family Reunion.” Organized by Foster Care Alumni of America, this event was created for, and attended by, individuals who spent time in Washington’s foster care system.

“All too often, youth in Washington and across the nation who are placed in foster care are separated from brothers and sisters, friends and family,” said Nathan Monell, executive director of Foster Care Alumni of America. “Most foster care alumni will never be invited to a family reunion or other traditional family gatherings. They will never eat favorite family recipes, play a game of whiffle ball, or sit around and share stories about the past. Today’s event transforms the classic family reunion into a community event, creating lasting memories for many of the 12 million foster care alumni nationwide.”

In Washington today, there are more than 10,000 children in foster care. They will spend an average of nearly two years in foster care and 42% will experience three or more placements. In 2006, 382 young people “aged out” of foster care in Washington without a family to rely on or a home to return to.

Today’s event, held at Wright Park, was attended by local alumni of the foster care system along with foster parents, professionals, administrators, and community members who care about foster care. In addition, Foster Care Alumni Family Reunions took place today in states across the nation, including: California, Texas, Arizona, Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

“This Alumni Family Reunion means a lot to me, because it is an opportunity to introduce my family to other alumni of foster care,” said Lura Harrison, who spent 12 years in foster care and attended today’s event. “I want my family to know others who’ve grown up like I did—without parents—I think it’s important for my son and husband to know about my history and what other alumni experience, too.”

A landmark child welfare bill passed on Wednesday by the House of Representatives could make a huge difference for many children and youth in foster care today. The Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act will ensure that more children can leave foster care for permanent families through adoption and guardianship, that fewer youth will “age out” of the system with no one to rely on, and that children in foster care will have improved health and educational outcomes. This bill, the most sweeping federal legislation in more than a decade, is now being considered by the Senate.

The honorary host committee for the Foster Care Alumni Family Reunion includes Congressional Representatives Jim McDermott (D-WA); Jerry Weller (R-IL); Shelley Berkley (D-NV), Chaka Fattah (D-PA), Dennis Cardoza (D-CA), Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA) and William C. Bell, President and CEO of Casey Family Programs, headquartered in Seattle.

“Tradition begins with a first step, and I am confident that the first Alumni Family Reunion is destined to become an important annual event in the lives of Americans who have been in foster care,” said Congressman McDermott (D-WA), co-author of the Fostering Connections to Success Act and an honorary host committee member for today’s event. “As Chairman of the House subcommittee that has jurisdiction over foster care, I want your help to make foster care better, so that one story we can share in the second annual reunion is about how we worked together to make a positive difference in the lives of young Americans.”
